Optimizing evidence for social work profession: A framework synthesizing evidence-based practice and practice-based

evidence

As a discipline, social work has faced longstanding skepticism about its scientific and professional legitimacy. To address this, researchers studying social work interventions have turned to evidence-based approaches as methodologies that facilitate scientific rigor. However, these researchers applying experimentalist evidence-based methods to social work have faced significant criticism that raises three core issues: the lack of generalizability of "standardized" quantitative evidence, the limited scope of the evidence collected and the oversimplifying of evidence integration methods. The effective application of an evidence-based approach to the field of health social work requires researchers to engage in a process of localization to suit the complex and personalized contexts in which social work interventions are based. This paper proposes an integrative framework that addresses the three aforementioned issues by setting out a program of research to support social work intervention design.

This framework consists of three stages: in the first stage, research evidence (both quantitative and qualitative) and practice evidence directly from professionals are collected to provide a comprehensive proposal of "best evidence" for intervention design. In the second stage, the researcher(s) collaborate with stakeholders to design the intervention and refine it. In the third stage, which follows the implementation of the intervention, the researcher(s) and stakeholders undertake comprehensive reflection and evaluation. This framework which marks a shift towards a localized evidence-based methodological framework for social work intervention studies, enables data integration (to expand the scope and generalizability of supporting evidence), methodological integration (to enable research flexibility and operability), and epistemological integration (to balance scientism and naturalism).
